I think we forget what it is like to be new or the stranger in the midst of people who have a history together. Don't you remember what it was like to be the new kid on the block? Or the first day at a new school? Who was the first person who greeted you? Wouldn't it have been nice if there was a few people who were there to show you around?

When we were baptized we were all welcomed into the family of God. We are all brother and sisters in Christ. So why is it hard to visit a new Church? Why does the guest or visitor often feel out of place or lost? How can we make the guest feel more welcome?

Have you noticed that many of Jesus' teachings center around welcoming a stranger? And that the welcoming is a way to share, proclaim and confess your faith? In Mark 9:37 we find; ***"Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me."*** We are all children of God, siblings of Christ. When we welcome we are doing God's work.

Peace Lutheran Church does a good job welcoming the guest or stranger in its midst. But is there more or a new way to welcome?

In order to truly welcome someone we need to accept them, just as you and I are accepted by Christ. We do this in many ways. I think one of the most profound ways is when we share the Lord's Table with other siblings.

Our history, humanities history, has the thread of hospitality woven into the tapestry of our world, lives and culture. We find the earliest writings referring to how a household welcomes the guest into their presence. The head of the household usually greets the guest, allows them to freshen themselves from the journey to their house and then provides refreshments. The guest is usually given the preferred place to wash up. The guest is also given the best food and drink the household has; served on the best dinnerware. Over the meal the guest becomes a friend, no longer a stranger.

When I was growing up I loved it when people would come to mom's house because we got to use mom's beautiful bone china. The only other time we used it was for Easter, Christmas and Thanksgiving. I remember getting in trouble on day when I asked mom is we weren't as special as our guests. Didn't we deserve the best? Mom's response was something to the effect I already know you. I don't need to make you feel welcomed, do I?

Now that I am older I agree and disagree with mom. Yes, by 'putting our best face on' and making 'an impression' we are showing the guest we are glad they came and we would like them to come again. But there is more to it. If we start treating everyone, even those we know as a special guest then when a guest comes our behavior becomes natural.

In September we will be starting the **Fruitfulness Forum**. The first part of the program we are going to look at is called **Radical Hospitality**. Peace does a great job of welcomes guests but are we using the best china.

Does our welcome accept the guest unconditionally? Do we welcome them back or scare them away? Welcome in our Church families calling. A calling to show hospitality to those who are new to the family as well as those who have been here for a while.

I pray that you will take this journey with me to see, hear and feel where the Holy Spirit is calling us in to serves.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - PATRICK J. TREPANIER

I have belonged to a number of organizations throughout the years. The greatest asset each of them had was not their property or money or other tangible 'things' but rather it was their people - people of different ages, sex, ethnicity, religions. The rich diversity of these people is what makes the organizations successful. People who are willing to give of themselves for the purpose of the organization without a desire or need for recognition; people who are rarely seen but without whom many necessary tasks would go undone.

On the other hand, the worst part of any organization is that it is made up of these same people. As soon as you get two or more people together as a group, you begin to have personality issues, ego trips and feelings get hurt. Then you have to deal with those who feel they have 'the power' and wield it poorly. Along with all of this, there are also the politics.

When I was very young, I wanted to be the leader of an organization - not because I thought I would make a good leader but rather for the prestige of the position. It did not happen which was good for both the organization and me. The group had a leader who could lead properly and I was better suited for the background work.

The department of which I am a part at work, Organizational Development, is responsible for the development of the leaders of the company. Some of the courses we offer include: 'Stepping Up To Supervision' which is for employees who want to explore the possibility of advancing into management; 'Foundations of Supervision' which is designed for people new to management; 'Performance Management' which is designed to provide supervisors with the tools required to properly and effectively conduct performance appraisals, as well as many other courses intended to improve one's leadership skills.

Leadership: Hundreds, if not thousands, of books have been written to define leadership as well as attempt to pass along techniques of how to lead. One definition of leadership is: a guiding or directing head of a group. The rest of this article is a compilation of various steps involved in the process of being a leader.

To be a leader, one does not have to be an elected official, or a CEO. A leader is someone that others consistently look to for guidance. A true leader inspires steadfast loyalty.

The first step towards becoming a leader is to look around and find ways to make the world as a whole, or even just their little corner, a better place. Listen to people. Think of problems in the broader sense - they are not always easy to define. Look for needs, niches, conflicts, gaps that need to be filled, and inefficiencies. The solutions do not always need to be creative or cutting edge; sometimes they are the simplest things.

Think of the big picture. As problems are being addressed and solved, patterns might be found. Those problems may be symptoms of deeper, bigger problems. Henry David Thoreau once said, "For every thousand hacking at the leaves of evil, one is hacking at the root." A leader needs to take a step back and try to find the root. The thing about the deeper problem is that it is not something anybody can solve alone; it will require a group effort, which is where the role of the leader comes into play.

Be proactive. If there are ideas about what the deeper issues are, it may be possible to predict the problems that may crop up. Instead of waiting for those problems to appear, take steps to prevent them. If the problems are not preventable, at least preparations may be possible. This is a difference between a leader and a manager. A good manager responds well to a variety of situations; a good leader takes effective action to prevent situations before they actually happen.

Make decisions, and take responsibility for the consequences. In order to exert influence and tackle bigger problems, decision-making power is required, and those decisions will affect the people who have given that power to the leader. This is as much a responsibility as it is an honor. Not only is it necessary to be able to make sound decisions, but it is also necessary to be willing to be held accountable for them. If things go wrong, people will assume it is the leader's fault (whether it is or not). Think of the captain of a ship; the fate of the ship is essentially in the captain's hands, and it is up to the captain to steer the ship in the right direction.



It is required that wisdom be exercised when calling the shots; hope for the best and prepare for the worst. If a person is not prepared to take responsibility for decisions - if they frequently struggle with hesitation and self-doubt - it might be a good idea to step down. An insecure leader may become a tyrant.

Share the vision. Leaders can often times see the bigger issues at hand. They can also see how things could be better if the obstacles could just be removed. To get people to help in changing things, the positive vision needs to be shared with them. Inspire them. Motivate them. Guide them. Show them how their actions are bringing everyone closer to that dream.

Remember that it's not all about you. The greatest leaders in history saw their role as a means to an end, and themselves as an instrument of a deeper purpose; any glory, prestige, or wealth was a side effect rather than a motivation. If a leader wants to realize a vision, the most effective way to do it is not with an army of drones; that army will only last as long as the original leader. For the most long-lasting results, the vision must be shared and let people adopt it as their own, and let it spread like wildfire. The leader needs to think of themselves as the beginning of a chain reaction--once it's begun, the leader can step away and it'll continue to happen without any effort on the leader's part. "A leader is best when people barely know he exists, when his work is done, his aim fulfilled, they will say: we did it ourselves." Lao Tzu

Charisma can be helpful, but it is not essential. There have been many admired leaders in human history who were not the friendliest, most charming person in the bunch. What was important, however, was that people trusted them, and they were inspired by his or her vision. What a leader needs is good communication skills (whether it is through speaking, writing, even art) so that the vision can be articulated.

Always practice what you preach. There's no better way to lose credibility as a leader than to be a hypocrite.

A leader is in the limelight, which means there is a certain loss of privacy involved. It may also be difficult to form close relationships of any kind with people in the group. There are always concerns about favoritism and preferential treatment.

How does all of this relate to Peace Lutheran Church? Some of us are leaders by virtue of having been elected to positions of responsibility. Some of us are leaders by virtue of holding positions of responsibility and authority for which we are paid. Some of us are leaders because we have volunteered to be Sunday School teachers, Altar guild members, choir members, musicians, ushers, greeters, worship or communion assistants, acolytes, crucifers, etc. The list can go on and on.

People can also be leaders just by being themselves. One does not have to be in a position of responsibility or authority to be a leader. As said earlier, a leader is someone who sees needs, niches, conflicts, gaps that need to be filled, and inefficiencies and then does something about it.

It is important to note that not everyone can be a leader. This is not a bad thing. Remember the adages: 'Too many cooks spoil the soup'; 'Too many chiefs, not enough Indians'. If everyone considers themselves to be the leader, there will be no one to do the work required to see the vision brought to fruition.

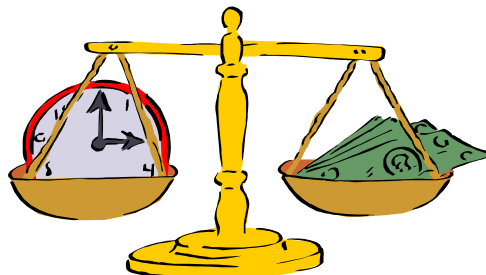

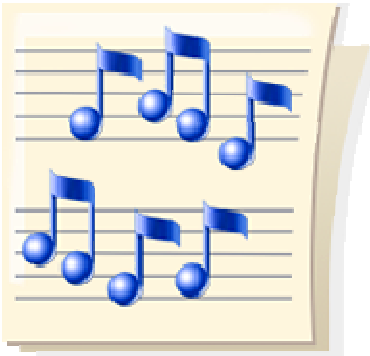

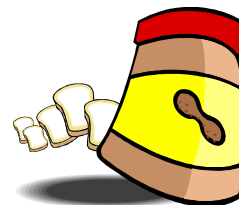
The program will begin again in **September 11th**. It only takes about 30 minutes of your time and it very rewarding and a great outreach ministry for Peace.

A few words from Deacon Gail

I know that you have begun to see the word "Fruitfulness" come up around the church lately and I also know that at least several of you have become curious as to what it is all about. Well here is my take.

Pastor Penny asked me to do some research to find an exciting and stimulating "Stewardship" program we could use at Peace this year. Almost about the same time, Gretchen Brown, shared a book with me about the 5 Practices a congregation should become involved in if they really wanted to grow not only in numbers but also in their faith. So I figured the Holy Spirit was once again at work and reviewed the material, presented Pastor with 3 or 4 options but highly recommended the "Fruitfulness Forum or Initiative." Just hours from my putting this issue of the Spirit on the presses, Pastor and I will lead a workshop for six volunteers, yes, they volunteered, no arm twisting or guilt trips were needed, who will in turn lead programs in "Radical Hospitality" and "Extravagant Generosity" during parts of September and October leading up to a sermon series Pastor will be delivering beginning in late October about all of the Practices of a thriving congregation. The ultimate climax for this study will be a Consecration Sunday Worship and Dinner on November 22nd.

Okay I can here you all now, you saying so what does this mean for me. Well it means that if you truly love your church, love your God and are willing to use the "change" word, we, the people of Peace actually will have a good understanding of what types of change need to take place at Peace within our own safe faith boundaries or boxes and what types of change we as a congregation need to make to make all feel truly welcome and grow in size.

No it is not all about just asking you to give more money but it is a program that is designed to change your thoughts and your thought processes about your personal relationship with God and your church.

We need to grow leaders, we need to encourage all of you to come out of your comfort zones and experience Christian growth.

What will be asked of you is to sign up and attend one of 6 groups for not more than 5 or 6 sessions where you and your group leader will share a journey. As Pastor and I lead the training groups will be set up in a variety of time offerings to give everyone a choice and Pastor Penny really, really, yes really wants you to make a commitment and participate.

Now most of you know I pray a lot and place a high value on listening to what the Lord tells me to do and right now He is telling me that you need to do this, each of you need to do this. So as I often do, I challenge you to pray about it and listen to the Lord. Make the time to come, open your hearts to change and listen with your souls.

You all wanted a Pastor and now you have one. A Pastor who, rightfully, is more than willing to lead and guide but will not take it all on herself or with just a commitment from a few. She needs and deserves your, the entire congregation's support with this program.

I stumbled on an old box of photos this summer and took a look at what appears to be about 25 years ago and I was amazed to see who taught Sunday School, and helped with VBS, who were leaders, and who served at the altar and I saw the joy that seemed to be on their faces as these candid shots showed them all engaged with children, children growing in faith.

I do understand that those same people are now 25 or more years older but I wish the spark they had back then would help set off the spark to ignite new ministries at Peace and inspire others.

One thing Pastor Penny said very early upon her accepting the Call to be our Pastor was she wanted us to grow in our own faith first before we just grew in numbers. I will always hold that thought close to my heart because she is right.

So please as the materials are released and the sign up sheets put out, open your hearts and from my favorite hymn, tell the Lord to send you - you to do his work.

HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS - JOANNE INGERSON, RN, PARISH NURSE

American Academy of Pediatrics Recommended Immunization Schedule for 0-18 years

(I will explain each of the vaccines & the diseases in more detail in the next few articles.)

Recommended Immunization Schedule for Persons Aged 0 Through 6 Years

Hepatitis B: Birth, 1-2 months, & 6-18 months

Rotavirus: 2 months, 4 months & 6 months

DTaP: 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, 15-18 months, & 4-6 years of age.

Haemophilus influenzae type b: 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, & 12-15 months

Pneumococcal: 2, 4, & 6 months, 12-15 months, & at 2-6 years for certain high risk groups

Influenza (flu shot): Should be given from 6 months to 6 years every year.

Measles, Mumps & Rubella: 12-15 months & 4-6 years

Varicella (chicken pox): 12-15 months & 4-6 years

Hepatitis A: 12-24 months (2 doses)

Recommended Immunization Schedule for Ages 7 Through 18 Years

Tetanus, Diphtheria, Pertussis: Ages 11-12 years

Human Papillomavirus: For females ages 11-12 years (3 doses)

Meningococcal: Ages 11-12 years

Influenza: Ages 7-18 every year

Recommended Adult Immunization Schedule

Tetanus, Diphtheria, Pertussis: Tdap 19-26 years, & Td every 10 years after

Human papillomavirus: For females 19-26 years (3 doses)

Varicella: Age 19 through greater than or equal to age 65 (2 doses)

Zoster: Age 60 through greater than or equal to age 65 (1 dose)

Measles, Mumps, Rubella - 19 to 40 (1 or 2 doses)

Influenza: Age 56 through greater than or equal to age 65 (1 dose every year)

Pneumococcal: Age 65 and above (1 dose)

More about the N1H1 virus in future issues of the Spirit. Remember to wash your hands regularly, get your flu shots and use common sense if you come down with the flu.
